
Dr. EDWARD SIDNEY KIEK

Edward Sidney Kiek was born in London in 1883. He went to Wadham College, Oxford in 1903, and took his B.A. degree with first-class honours in modern history, then studied at Mansfield College, Oxford, and trained for the Congregational Ministry under Dr. Fairbairn. His first full-time pastorate was at Newcastle-under-Lyme, in 1908, during which time he took his M.A. and D.D. degrees. His ministry at Square Congregational Church, Halifax, was from 1912 to 1920 following time spent at Stoke-on-Trent. Dr. Kiek was an outstanding preacher and lecturer and had a well established reputation as such very early in his career.

Dr. Kiek and his family migrated to Australia in 1920 so that he could take up the position of principal at Parkin Theological College in Adelaide, a position he held until his retirement in 1957. He then filled two interim pastorates, one in Brisbane and one at Katoomba, N.S.W., before his death in 1959.

As well as his role as principal, Dr. Kiek was a prolific writer and speaker, and with his wife (also a Congregational Minister) he was involved in many and varied organisations. (Based on an article from the Halifax Courier, 9/5/1959).
